Dear Chairman Thompson and Ranking Member Craig:

On behalf of the Biological Products Industry Alliance (BPIA), I write to urge your support for the Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2026 (H.R. 7567).

BPIA is the leading trade association in North America representing the agriculture biological products industry. Our 180 member companies are involved in the manufacturing, marketing, and distribution of biological products, including biostimulants, biopesticides, and biofertilizers. Together, our members represent a broad cross-section of the agricultural biologicals industry and work to provide farmers with tools that support productivity, resilience, and sustainability.

U.S. agriculture has waited far too long for a new Farm Bill. At a time of continued market volatility, rising production costs, global competition, and growing pressure on farmers to produce more with fewer resources, the House should move forward with a long-overdue bill that provides certainty and a clearer path forward for producers, rural communities, and agricultural innovators alike.

For BPIA, the Farm Bill is especially important because it includes the bipartisan Plant Biostimulant Act of 2025 (H.R. 3783). This provision would establish a clear federal definition for plant biostimulants and provide the clarity and predictability needed to support innovation, encourage investment, and expand grower access to biological tools that can improve crop performance, resource efficiency, and resilience.


The bill also takes an important step by recognizing innovative technologies in conservation practices, including biological fertilizers, biostimulants, enhanced efficiency fertilizers, and other tools that can help reduce nutrient loss. This better

aligns federal conservation policy with the tools growers are already using in the field to improve efficiency, resilience, and sustainability.

Taken together, these provisions reflect a more modern understanding of agriculture and the growing role biological products can play in helping farmers meet agronomic, economic, and environmental goals. Rather than rely on another short-term extension, the House should pass a Farm Bill that reflects the needs of modern agriculture and provides a stronger foundation for the future.

Thank you for your consideration and for your leadership on the House Agriculture Committee. We appreciate your work on this important legislation and stand ready to serve as a resource as the process moves forward.
